Parchment, central bifolium of a quire, missing the outer and lower sections of both leaves, with loss of text. Present leaf dimensions: 160 x c. 110 mm. Used as cover for a book (see below); ff. 1r and 2v are soiled.

Pricked and ruled with lead for one column of text (on each page most of the 19 upper lines is preserved of the original 26); writing below top line. There are three bounding lines at left, two at right; and there is an additional vertical line in the inner margin close to the fold.

Copied probably by a single hand in a “hors système” script: Gothic Textualis Libraria using Cursiva d. Change in ink shade on f. 1v10 from brown to black. The opening letters of all verses are in a separate column.

Undecorated, except for a 1-line red versal and a 2-line plain red initial M on the last but one line of f. 2r (“Marrubium”).

Above “Marrubium” on f. 2r, the gloss in Cursiva: “Prassium album”. The bifolium was used as a binding for Galeatus Capella, *De rebus nuper in Italia gestis libri octo* (Antwerp, J. Grapheus?), 1533. Nijhoff-Kronenberg, 519.

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
