Parchment. 2 folios (both partial). Fol. 1 measures 145 x 121 mm; fol. 2 measures 145 x 127 mm (original dimensions and written space uncertain; width of written space of 1 column: 115 mm). 1 column. 14 lines of original ca. 25 remaining. Dry-point ruling; single vertical bounding lines.

Written in pre-Caroline minuscule, dated by Bernhard Bischoff to the first third of the ninth century and attributed to southeastern Germany (letter of 5 October 1985). The Kraus catalogue is uncharacteristically specific in ascribing these fragments to Salzburg, s. IXth c. This ascription may reflect some information on provenance that is unknown to us. 1-line initials are in brown uncials, with rustic capital E, and are not set apart from the text. Punctuation consists of the punctus, punctus versus and punctus elevatus.

A fifteenth-century hand has added "Deus qui sedes super tronos" between the second and third lines and "iusti erunt in memoria eterna angelorum sanctorum" between the third and fourth lines of fol. 2r
